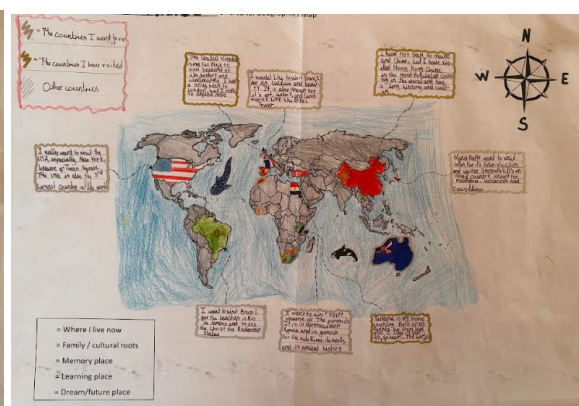

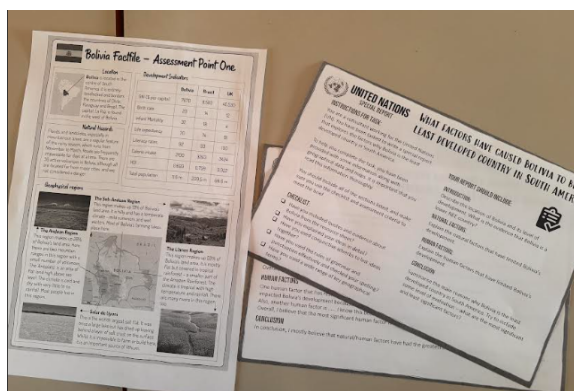
In Geography, Year 7 have been using maps, compasses, atlases and photographs as geographical artefacts to explore the geography of places, heading into the school gardens to capture and interpret links between human and physical geography.



Year 8 have been studying population and linking this to their own lives by creating personal geographies maps, using atlases to explore their local and global connections.

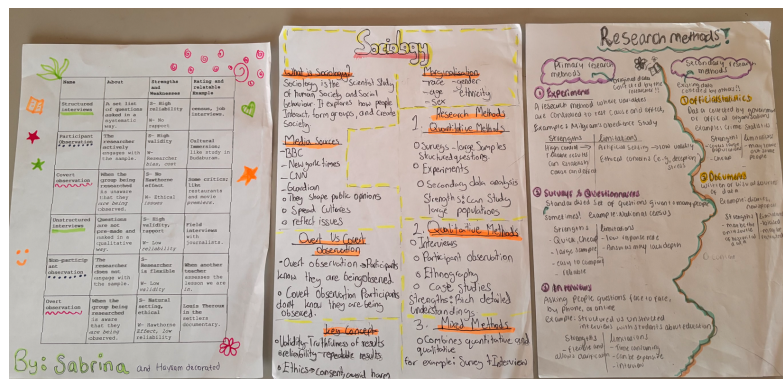


Year 9 have rounded off their development topic by writing UN style reports on why Bolivia is the least 'developed' country in South America, applying data, maps and evidence to support their arguments.



Year 12 have been encouraged to think in systems, exploring how people and environments interact in complex and dynamic ways.

In Sociology, Year 10 students have completed their Research Methods topic, learning how sociologists investigate the social world and preparing to apply these skills to real-world issues.



Across both subjects, students have shown curiosity, creativity and growing confidence in interpreting and questioning the world around them.
